Why Do Girls Like Pink?

If you walked into a clothes store without signs, would you know if it was a man's or a woman's store by only looking at the colors? What colors would you look for? Most people would associate vibrant colors and pastel shades, especially pink, with women, and more muted colors like gray, brown, and black, with men. But where did these associations come from?

In 1918, a publication called *Earnshaw's Infants Department* declared that the generally accepted rule was that pink, being a bolder color, was more suited to a boy, and blue, being more delicate, was prettier for girls. Other publications suggested blue was for blue-eyed babies and pink for brown-eyed babies. Up to the 19th century, it was quite normal for male babies to wear dresses, so when did the distinctions we have today start appearing?

It seems that gender-specific colors weren't clearly established until the 1940s as a result of decisions by manufacturers and retailers that pink was more feminine. In fact, studies at the time showed that, given the choice, both genders would opt for blue. The color divide was strengthened with the arrival of prenatal testing, which allowed parents to know the sex of their unborn child and start buying accordingly. This delighted manufacturers, who could sell more to two distinct markets.

It is argued that these stereotypes are not natural and create biases in young children. In one study, children up to the age of two expressed no preference for either color. However, around the age of four, when they were more conscious of their gender, boys started rejecting pink toys.

Today, with customers complaining about overly pink aisles for girls, and boys' aisles full of robots and cars, there are signs that we might be returning towards more gender neutrality in stores.
